2018 Indigenous Innovation Initiative Summer Student

IMPORTANT PROGRAM INFORMATION

How do I know if I am eligible to apply?

To be eligible for the Indigenous Innovation Initiative summer student position, at the time of submitting an application, individuals must be currently enrolled in a post-secondary institution or have graduated within the last year (12 months) from a post-secondary institution.

I am an international student; am I still eligible to apply?

International students are eligible to apply as long as they meet the standard eligibility criteria (above) and are authorized to work in Canada. Costs and arrangements for travel, visas, accommodation and living expenses are the responsibility of the student and will not be arranged or covered by Grand Challenges Canada.

How do I apply to the Indigenous Initiative summer student position?

A complete application includes:

- Application Form
- Short Answer Questions Form
- Resume (maximum two pages)
- Indigenous persons are encouraged to self-identify

The Application Form and Short Answer Questions Form can be accessed through the [Careers](#) page on Grand Challenges Canada's website. Begin by downloading the Short Answer Questions Form. Once you have completed the Short Answer Questions Form, you must fill out the Application Form online. Through the Application Form web page, you will be able to attach the completed Short Answer Questions Form, and your resume. Once these materials are attached, you will be able to submit your application through the Application Form web page.

Please do not submit a cover letter, reference letters or any additional application material other than what is requested.

Please note that once your application has been submitted, it will no longer be possible to make changes to it.

What if my current or most recent academic institution does not use the Grade Point Average (GPA) system?

Only in the case where your current or most recent academic institution does not use the GPA system, you may self-report your academic average as a letter or numeric value (e.g., as an average of B+ or 80%).

What does the application process entail?

The first-round of applications consists of a written application package (Application Form, Short Answer Questions Form, Resume) submitted to Grand Challenges Canada. These are scored on the basis of the following criteria:

- Relevance of experience and skills to position of interest
- Demonstrated interest in Indigenous health
- Program-specific requirements, if applicable.

The top-scoring applicants will be invited for an interview at Grand Challenges Canada's office in Toronto, Ontario. Other arrangements may be made on a case-by-case basis for interviewees located outside of Toronto.

What is the timeline for the application process?

Please consult Grand Challenges Canada's website for exact dates. For reference, a general timeline is as follows:

- Successful applicants notified: March to April 2018
- Orientation and start date: April 30, 2018
- Position end date: August 24, 2018

Please note this timeline is subject to change. Any changes will be announced through our website and social media platforms.

Is this a paid position? If so, how much can I expect to be compensated? Compensation is aligned with the University Health Network regulations. Costs and arrangements for travel, accommodation and living expenses are the responsibility of the student, and will not be arranged or covered by Grand Challenges Canada.

When does this position begin and end?

The Indigenous Innovation Initiative summer student should be available to work from the week of May through to August 24.

Where is this position located?

The Indigenous Innovation Initiative summer student will work with Grand Challenges Canada's team at our office in the MaRS Centre, 661 University Avenue, Toronto, Ontario.

What is the typical work schedule?

This is a full-time position (37.5 hours per week) following regular business hours, Monday to Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

When and how will I be notified about the status of my application?

Applicants will be notified by email of the status of their application between March and April 2018.

Do I need to have a health background to apply or to be competitive? Are there any specific prerequisites?

Applicants do not need to have a health background (such as a Bachelor of Science) to apply or to be competitive for the Indigenous Innovation Initiative summer student position. In line with the principles of Integrated Innovation, Grand Challenges Canada values the experiences and perspectives of diverse disciplines. A demonstrated interest in Indigenous health will be considered an asset.

Some positions may require applicants to have specific prerequisites (such as skill sets or academic backgrounds); in these cases, expected prerequisites will be clearly specified in the job description.
